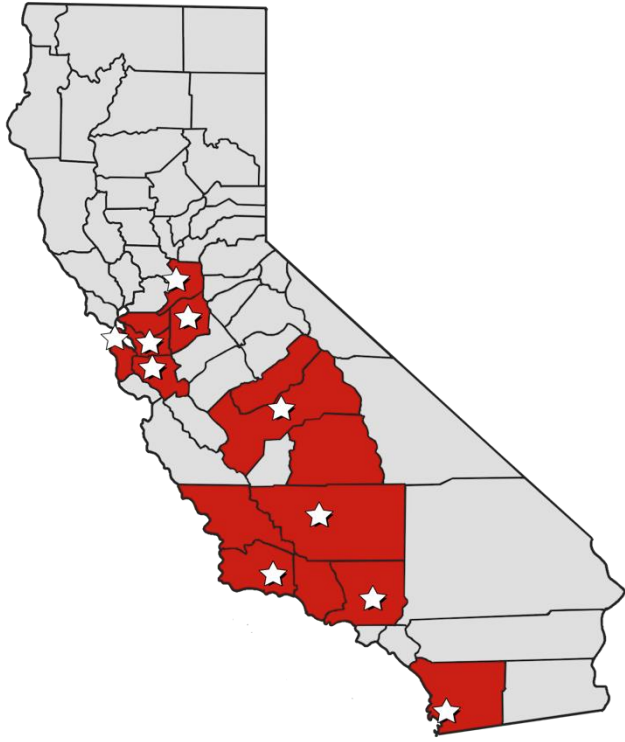

IMPACT STATEMENT

The CalHOPE Redline is committed to addressing the needs of American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) peoples living in California who have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The Redline offers AIANs a direct dial number, text messaging and live chat service linking individuals to local wellness resources and peer emotional support. The Redline is a dedicated team of peer support navigators who work to provide resources for AIAN peoples and organizations that serve AIANs, linking our community to county and statewide resources to address the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.



Current CalHOPE Redline Services:

- 1 program lead
- 5 counselors (2 shift leads)
- **Services available:** phone, SMS/text, live chat
- Phone lines officially opened April 19, 2020
- **Operating days/hours:** Monday-Friday 9 AM - 5 PM



CalHOPE Redline Navigator Role

- The navigators are the heart of the Redline. They are on the lines with the community providing peer-support and Native-focused resources and referrals.
- Ambassadors who are bridging the gap to services and working towards breaking down stigma that exist within our communities.
- Provide deep meaningful listening to our communities as they navigate through challenges brought forward by COVID-19.
- Outreach to organizations serving American Indians living in California.
- Support one another as a team, focusing on both self-care and community-care

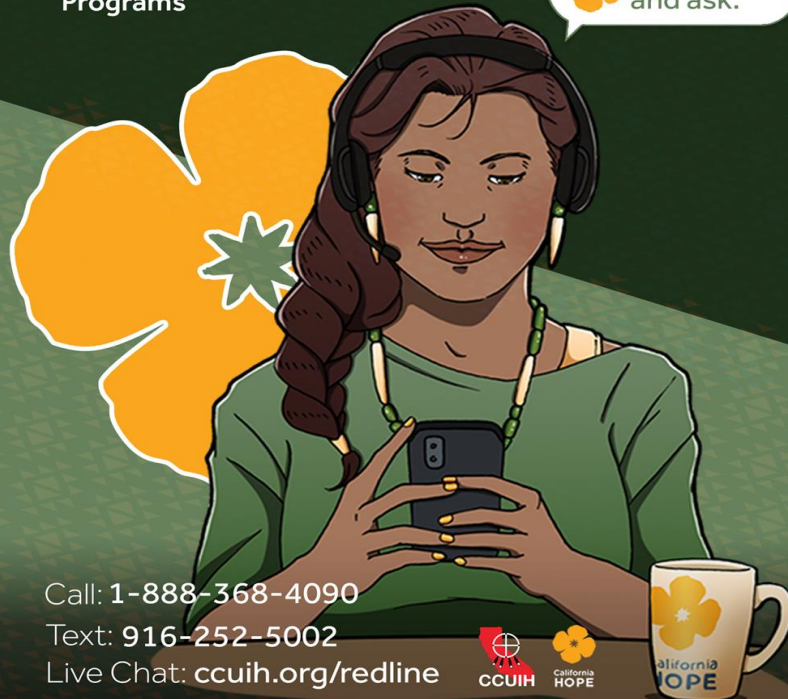
